Roosevelt County Fair Board has dedicated the 2023 fair in

MEMORY OF JOY BEST



Agriculture and education were both instilled into her very bones, according to Joy Best. So, she combined these two foundational cornerstones into a lifelong desire to serve her family and community through 4-H and the New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service. Joy Morgan Best was born in 1934 in Floyd, New Mexico, on the same farm that her father, Ike Morgan, was born on in 1907. The Morgan family farmed and ran a small dairy in rural Roosevelt County during Joy's childhood. After marrying Wendell Best in 1952, they ranched south of Floyd where they raised their four children. The agricultural lifestyle was important to the Best Family, and they worked to educate others in order to help maintain this way of life. Given her vast background in agriculture and Roosevelt County, it was only natural for Joy to want to work in an industry that promoted the same values she and her family held dear. Therefore, in 1977, Joy became the Roosevelt County Home Economist through the NMSU Extension Service and then became the county director in 1985.

Joy attended Floyd Schools for much of her elementary and secondary education. There, she was involved in Future Homemakers of America

(FHA), volleyball, softball, and 4-H. She made history by being the first female to make and then model a pant suit at the National 4-H Congress in Chicago in 1951. Joy was always a leader in whatever she was involved in; however, she led with a servant's heart and with the best interest of others in mind.

During her time with the NMSU Extension Service, Joy served as an officer in many local, state, and national organizations. She also received numerous state and national honors including the Governor's Award for New Mexico Outstanding Women in 1988 and was inducted into the New Mexico 4-H Hall of Fame in 2005. Joy had a star named after her when she received a service award from New Mexico State University. Many Roosevelt County 4-H kids fondly remember the many district contest and state conference trips Joy chaperoned as well as the various sewing projects she supervised, consumer decision making teams she coached, and favorite foods tables she helped set up. She was also active in the New Mexico Beef Ambassador program, the Roosevelt County Homemakers Club, and the Portales PEO. The Roosevelt County Fair was always a special time for Joy. She had a passion to ensure the citizens of Roosevelt County experienced only the best. Joy retired from the Extension Service in 1997 after serving twenty years in a position that she felt was foundationally important to the county's families. In addition to her work with the Extension Service and 4-H, Joy and Wendell were associated with the New Mexico High School Rodeo Association and the National High School Rodeo Association from 1973-2003, when they retired in order to attend their grandchildren's sporting events, livestock shows, and rodeos.

Joy will always be Mema to her family. She and Wendell raised four children, Barbara, Monte, Kent, and Kyle. They had thirteen grandchildren, eighteen great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild that was born soon after her passing. The living legacy that Joy and Wendell left is astounding and a testament to their love for family, faith, and the agricultural way of life.

In addition to her family, Joy considered the kids and families she worked with through 4-H and the various other programs she was involved in as her own. The respect and honor that the community has always shown Joy was well deserved and cherished. She was truly a remarkable woman that will be missed.

- **SEC 2** ANY PERSON WHO VIOLATES ANY OF THE FOLLOWING OR SPECIAL RULES WILL FORFEIT ALL PRIVILEGES AND PREMIUMS AND BE SUBJECT TO SUCH PENALTY AS THE GOVERNING BOARD MAY ORDER.
- **SEC 3** THE ROOSEVELT COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL BE IN CHARGE OF THE MERCHANTS BUILDING VENDORS.
- **SEC 4** FAIR OFFICIALLY OPENS TUESDAY, AUGUST 22ND AT 5:00 PM.

Rule 2

POLICING AND LIABILITY

- **SEC 1** THE ROOSEVELT COUNTY FAIR OFFICIALS WILL TAKE EVERY PRECAUTION FOR THE SAFETY OF THE VISITORS AND EXHIBITS BUT ASSUME NO LIABILITY FOR PERSONAL INJURY OR FOR LOSS OR DAMAGES TO ANY PROPERTY OF THE CONCESSIONAIRE, EXHIBITOR OR PATRON DUE TO THEFT, TORNADO, WEATHER CONDITIONS OR OTHER CAUSES.
- **SEC 2** THE USE OR POSSESSION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND CANNABIS IS PROHIBITED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

RULE 3

ENTRIES, RELEASES, AND REMOVALS

- SEC 1 COMPETITIONS WILL BE OPEN TO ROOSEVELT COUNTY RESIDENTS, A CURRENT ENROLLED STUDENT OF A VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT IN ROOSEVELT COUNTY, A 4-H OR FFA MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING IN A ROOSEVELT COUNTY CLUB OR A ROOSEVELT COUNTY EXTENSION ASSOCIATION CLUB.
- SEC 2 NO SUPERINTENDENT SHALL, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, ALLOW THE ENTRY BOOKS TO GO FROM HIS/HER POSSESSION, OR TO BE INSPECTED BY ANYONE, EXCEPT AUTHORIZED OFFICERS UNTIL ENTRIES CLOSE. ANY EXHIBITOR OR PERSON ACTING AS AN EXHIBITOR FOUND LOOKING THROUGH THE ENTRY BOOKS OF THE EXHIBITORS WILL FORFEIT ALL PREMIUMS OR MONEY WON.
- **SEC 3** EXHIBITS ERRONEOUSLY ENTERED MAY BE TRANSFERRED BY THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DEPARTMENT TO THE PROPER SECTION FOR JUDGING AND SHALL BE CONSIDERED AS HAVING BEEN ORIGINALLY ENTERED IN SUCH SECTION AND THE RECORD SHALL BE CHANGED ACCORDINGLY.
- SEC 4 NO ENTRY WILL BE CONSIDERED COMPLETE UNTIL ALL FEES AND CHARGES HAVE BEEN PAID.
- **SEC 5** ALL ENTRIES MUST BE MADE AT THE TIME AS SPECIFIED IN THE SCHEDULE.

- **SEC 6** EXHIBITS HAVING NO COMPETITION WILL RECEIVE AWARDS ON A MERIT BASIS TO BE DECIDED BY THE JUDGE.
- **SEC 7** THE EXHIBITOR IS RESPONSIBLE FOR CLEANLINESS AND SANITARY CONDITIONS OF EXHIBITS AND AREAS INSPECTED AND CLEANED AT THE EXHIBITOR'S EXPENSE.
- SEC 8 ALL EXHIBITS NOT PICKED UP WILL BE KEPT AT THE EXTENSION OFFICE FOR A PERIOD OF 30 DAYS. ARTICLES NOT PICKED UP DURING THAT TIME WILL BE DISPOSED OF.

ENTRIES IN YOUTH, HOME ARTS, AND PAVILION BUILDINGS WILL BE RELEASED ON MONDAY AFTER THE FAIR FROM 4 — 6 PM.

FAIR PARKING

Exhibitors & Vendors

- 1. Vehicles inside the fairgrounds must have an exhibitor car pass visible at all times or vehicle will be towed at the owner's expense.
- 2. The driver and all passengers must have an armband on before vehicle will be allowed to enter the fairgrounds.

Public Parking

- 1. Available in the Extension Office Parking lot, 705 East Lime Street and at the west entrance on Boston Street between the County Road Barn and the Police Department.
- 2. Do not park in the areas reserved for Extension Office Personnel on the east side of the Extension Office.

Livestock Trailers

1. Once all livestock has been unloaded, exhibitors must take stock trailers home.

RV Parking

- 1. You will need to park in designated RV parking area only, in assigned spaces, reserved and paid (\$25.00) for in the Extension Office by July 28th at 5:00 pm.
- 2. No electrical, sewer or water connections will be provided.
- 3. Generators must be turned off by midnight.
- 4. RV users must check-in at the Fair Office.
- 5. RV must be in place by 8:00 pm on Monday, August 21st.
- 6. All trash and debris must be cleaned up before premium checks will be issued.
- 7. No RV will be allowed to enter after the fair opens to the public.
- 8. Space is limited, first come, first served basis.

Indoor Exhibit Superintendents

- 1. Youth Building Superintendents enter in the West gate and you can park behind Youth Building.
- 2. Home Art Building Superintendents enter in the West gate and you can park behind the Home Arts Building.
- 3. Fine Art Building Superintendents enter in the East gate and you can park behind the Fine Arts Building.

Merchant Building Vendors

- 1. Enter in the West gate, you must have a car pass and an arm band to enter at this gate. You can park behind the Merchants Building.
- 2. If you do not have an arm band, you must first go to the main gate and purchase an arm band before you can enter onto the fairground in your vehicle.

1. Livestock must be pre-entered and entry fees paid by Friday, July 28th, 6 pm at the Extension Office or online.

- 2. Livestock (including poultry) (exception Steers and Breeding Beef and Horses) must be in place on fairgrounds by 6 pm, Monday August 21st, unless otherwise stated. Steers and Breeding Beef must be in place on grounds by 9:00 am Wednesday, August 23rd.
- 3. To be eligible, exhibitors must be an unmarried, a regularly enrolled student of a vocational agriculture department, a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County and not past their 20th birthday by January 1st of the current year.
- 4. All animals in the Market Classes will be weighed at the fairgrounds on Entry Day (Steers and Breeding Beef Wednesday at 10 am).
- 5. Superintendents have the authority to make exhibit groups to fit classes as he or she sees fit.
- 6. Ownership deadline will be on or before the State Fair validation for Roosevelt County exhibitors. Roosevelt County validation dates coincide with State Fair validation dates for Roosevelt County. All animals must be validated and tagged to show.
- 7. The owner must show his/her own animal at the time of judging. Should the owner have more than one animal in a class, an eligible substitute will be allowed. Substitutes must qualify under Rule 3.
- 8. There will be no limit to the number of animals that any one exhibitor may have in one class. No exhibitor may receive more than two (2) premiums in the same class.
- 9. Animals entered on a partnership basis (brothers, sisters, etc.) will be considered as one exhibit. Rule 3 will apply.

- 10. Should there be any unnecessary or embarrassing delay in bringing animals into the show ring, the Superintendent may exclude such animals from competition.
- 11. Interference with judges. If any exhibitor in any way, in person, or by agent or servants, interferes with the judges using their adjudication, or show disrespect to them or the show, the management may also withhold from such exhibitors such premiums that they may have been awarded or take such other steps as they deem desirable.
- 12. First Year Feeder Class is open to all First Year Feeders who have never exhibited that species at a County Fair. Any breed of that species is eligible. Animals will also compete in respective class in market Show.
- 13. All animals presented for exhibition at the Roosevelt County fair shall be free from contamination of infectious diseases, and shall be subjected to examination on arrival at the fairgrounds, and to daily inspection during the fair. Should any animal be found to be infected with any contagious infectious or communicable disease, it shall immediately be removed to a place of quarantine. The show pens or stall in which such diseased animal or animals were kept must immediately be cleaned and disinfected under the supervision of the official veterinarian.
- 14. The Fair officials reserve the right to refuse entry of stock that is not, in their judgment, in suitable show condition. Furthermore, the right is reserved to exclude such unfit stock from the grounds.
- 15. A sifting committee shall be appointed by the Junior Livestock Superintendents. The committee will sift any inferior animals that may hinder the quality of the show. Sifting will take place at 6 pm, Monday, August 21st. Sifted animals must be removed from the barn immediately.
- 16. Livestock Superintendents will assign pens.
- 17. Exhibitors must furnish all water pails and feed boxes. Public tanks and feed boxes are unsanitary and unsafe.
- 18. Animals, stalls and pens must be neatly kept. Indoor/outdoor carpet can be used for bedding for sheep and goats. Cedar fiber will be used for steers and dairy heifers. No straw or wood chips allowed in Event Center, Wood chips must be used for swine, rabbits and poultry. Pathways and approaches must be kept clean for the convenience of spectators. The work must be completed by 10 am each day.
- 19. ALL Livestock including Poultry will be released between 6:00 am and 9:00 am, Sunday, August 27th. All animals MUST be removed from fairgrounds by 9:00 am.
- 20. Protests Three (3) individuals must submit written protests and be accompanied by \$60 cash or certified check which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Superintendent of the Show immediately

after the occasion for such protest. Protests must be submitted either prior to judging or immediately after the conclusion of the CLASS judging. Once an animal reaches championship judging, NO protest will be accepted. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that a judge overlooked an animal will be considered.

21. All livestock must meet the New Mexico Livestock Board inspection/tagging requirements and have inspection papers.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY FITTING

- 1. The exhibitor must be "actively" involved in preparing their animal for the show. The exhibitor's involvement is the responsibility of the parents/guardians.
- 2. All livestock must be clipped before they arrive at the fair. Touch up clipping is allowed and is left up to the Superintendent's discretion.
- 3. Artificial or mechanical exercise equipment is banned from the fairgrounds.

Herdsmanship begins upon arrival on the fairgrounds until the close of the fair Herdsmanship premiums and buckle will be given in the following Junior Livestock Classes:

- Market Swine
- Market Goats
- Market Lambs

- Replacement Dairy Heifers
- Market Beef*

*Breeding Beef and Market Steer Awards have been combined

The following rules will apply in order to be eligible:

- 1. The exhibitor shall be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County or have shown a beef heifer as it is an open show.
- 2. The animal shall be entered in the livestock show by the exhibitor.
- 3. The conformation of the animal or animals WILL NOT be judged. Only the Herdsmanship ability of the exhibitor. (Fitting, grooming presentation, and/or showing, appearance of exhibitor, sportsmanship, etc. will be judged).

The Herdsmanship contest will be based on participation of each of the following for the DURATION OF THE FAIR:

- Neatness and cleanliness of stall or pen area
- Animals presented in stall/pens
- Care and feeding of the animals
- Cooperation between exhibitor with superintendents and/or peers, etc.
- Participation during weigh-in time

HERDSMANSHIP SUGGESTIONS

A good herdsman of any kind of animal:

- 1. Is aware that the primary purpose for showing an animal is to assist the animal in making a favorable impression on the judge.
- 2. Makes sure that both he/she and his/her animal are clean and well groomed.
- 3. The feet of his/her animal trimmed to permit it to stand and walk correctly.
- 4. Brings the animal into the ring promptly. Makes it his/her business to find out when the class is to be judged.
- 5. Is alert and follows explicit instructions issued by the judge, clerk or ringmaster.
- 6. Is courteous at all times, particularly to the judge and competing showmen.
- 7. Is prepared to give a prompt and correct answer to any questions pertaining to the animal.
- 8. Gives the animal his/her undivided attention while in the ring. Smoking or chewing tobacco at such times is a breach of etiquette.
- 9. Is a modest winner and a gracious loser. Winner of runner-up honors always offers congratulations to first prize or championship winner.
- 10. Does not leave the ring until the class is placed and records completed.

 Retirement from the ring takes place in the order of the placing of the class.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

Showmanship contests are separate events from the Herdsmanship contest. Showmanship awards will be chosen by the show judges of each species.

- 1. To be eligible, exhibitors must be a resident of Roosevelt County or regularly enrolled student of a vocational agriculture department, a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in a Roosevelt County Club.
- 2. There will be (2) divisions: Junior Open and 4-H/FFA. Youth cannot enter both Junior Open & 4-H/FFA.
- 3. Pre-registration required by Friday, July 28th, 5 pm in the Extension Office.
- 4. Birds will be entered using the following criteria.

Waterfowl and Other pure breed will be shown as singles only.

All birds in any pen must be of same breed.

Birds may be shown by one (1) exhibitor in one (1) division.

- 5. APA and BA recognized breeds accepted. No cross breeds accepted, except for Meat Pen. **Fighting Breeds will not be accepted.**
- 6. All Rooster with spurs longer than one inch (1") will be not be allowed to enter.
- 7. The Superintendent can refuse any entry deemed harmful due to disease or parasites.
- 8. Decisions of the judges are final. Unsportsmanlike conduct can cause the entries to be disqualified and all awards forfeited.
- 9. All entries are cared for by the exhibitor. Eggs become property of the Poultry Department and will be destroyed. The Poultry Department is not responsible for accidents, mistakes, loss or damage that should happen to occur. All entries entered at sole risk of the owner.
- 10. Judging will be Tuesday, August 22nd at 10 am. The poultry area will be open during judging for anyone interested in observing the show.

- 11. **MEAT PEN** open to only 4-H and FFA members who are enrolled in the poultry project or SAE to qualify. Chicks should be hatched after June 1st of this year. Meat pens shall have a minimum per pen weight of 12 lbs. with an average of 4 lbs. per bird and a maximum per pen weight of 18 lbs. with an average of 6 lbs. per bird. Birds in Meat Pen the Champion Meat Pen will be eligible for the Junior Livestock sale on Friday, August 25th. If 11 or more meat pen entries are shown, the Reserve Champion Meat Pen will sell as well.
- 12. **4-H/FFA Fancy Class** is open to chickens, waterfowl or turkeys. Champion or Reserve Champion class award may be a single entry, a trio, or a member of a trio. The judge will place the top eight (8) birds, with the Champion being the first eligible bird for the Junior Livestock Sale on Friday, August 25th. In the event that the exhibitor of the champion bird choses to pull the bird from the Junior Livestock Sale, the next placing exhibitor will become eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale. Only one bird from the 4-H/FFA Fancy class will be eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 13. **Barnyard Class** will be made up of any entries that are not correctly classified when entered into the Poultry Show. The birds in this class **will not** be eligible for the sale.

BARN DUTY

- All Poultry Exhibitors and a parent or guardian will be required to sign up for "Barn Duty" which consists of 2 hour shifts during the fair week.
- Barn Duty responsibilities include but are not limited to:
 - a) Maintaining water in all cages,
 - b) Prevent the public from harassing, poking, or feeding the birds,
 - c) Answer questions from the public about poultry care and showmanship,
 - d) Clean trash and other debris from barn area including manure and wood chips.
 - e) Feeding will be limited to three times daily as posted by superintendent.
 - f) Exhibitors can maintain the care, feeding and watering of their birds at their own discretion.
 - g) All exhibitors must be able to identify the breed(s) at time of entry. If any exhibitor is unable to identify the breed of any entry, that entry will not be eligible for the sale and will be place in the "Barnyard" class.

Entries will be released on Sunday, August 27th, between 6:00 and 9:00 am.

Birds MUST be out by 9:00 am.

All pens, floor and surrounding area needs to be cleaned by the exhibitors at this time. Failure to do so may result in loss of showing privileges next year.

Saturday, August 19th, 9:00 am, in the Events Center Showmanship classes will follow the Junior Show

- 1. The Rabbit Show will be open to all unmarried YOUTH residents of Roosevelt County who have not passed their 20th birthday by January 1st of the current year.
- 2. The Junior Rabbit Meat Pen and the Junior Showmanship Competition will be open only for a 4-H/FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County.
- 3. The General Livestock Rules will apply to 4-H and FFA members.
- 4. The Superintendent reserves the right to refuse entry of rabbits deemed harmful to other entries because of disease or parasites.
- 5. All Rabbits are entered at sole risk of the owner. The management will not be responsible for any accidents, mistakes, loss or damage that occurs.
- 6. All Rabbits must be owned 30 days prior to the fair.
- 7. All Rabbits must have a readable permanent tattoo in the left ear.
- 8. The Rabbits will be cared for by the exhibitor during the duration of the fair.
- 9. The decisions of the judge will be final. Unsportsmanlike conduct will cause the entry to be disqualified and all premiums to be forfeited.
- 10. Only recognized pure breeds may be entered in the show. Crossbreed rabbits will be accepted in the meat pens. The Judge and Superintendent will make classes as they consider necessary.
- 11. Junior Rabbit Meat Pen will consist of three (3) rabbits not to exceed 10 weeks of age. Each Rabbit shall weigh no less than three and a half pounds (3 ½) pounds and no more than five and a half pounds (5 ½).
- 12. All youth exhibitors will bring their animals to the judging table.
- 13. Parents, leaders, guardians, etc. are not allowed to help the exhibitors. If an exhibitor cannot be present the day of the show, arrangements must be made, in advance, with the Superintendent.
- 14. No person, other than the show officials, judges and clerks will be allowed behind the judging tables during judging. Keep in mind that distracting the judges with conversation and questions about your animal during the show is considered inappropriate. Save questions until after judging is over with.
- 15. No entries will be accepted without pre-registration, due on-line or in the Extension Office by Friday, July 28th by 5:00 pm.
- 16. Each Rabbit exhibitor and a parent or guardian are **REQUIRED** to sign up for "Barn Duty" which consists of a 2-hour shift **per** exhibitor during the fair week. See the Superintendent for the sign-up sheet.

Barn duty responsibilities include but are not limited to:

- a) Maintain water in all rabbit cages.
- b) Supervise the public while viewing the rabbits not allowing them to poke, feed, or harass rabbits.
- c) Answer questions from the public about rabbit care, management, and showmanship.
- d) Keep area clean and free from debris and trash including manure and woodchips.
- e) Any additional duties as deemed necessary.
- 17. All Rabbits will be released at close of show on Saturday except the Meat Pens placing 1st 10th, Best in Show, Reserve Best in Show, Best of Breeds, Best Opposite of Breeds, Best of Variety and Best Opposite of Variety. Any junior exhibitor wishing to display his/her rabbit for duration of the fair will be allowed to. Rabbits at the fairgrounds will be released Sunday, August 27th from 6:00 9:00 am.
- 18. Only rabbits entered into the fair may remain on the fairgrounds after the show. No additional rabbits may be brought to the fair during the week. Also, no rabbits may be sold during the course of the fair.
- 19. Showmanship contest Exhibitors may sign up for showmanship the day of the show. There will be four age categories: Booster (8 and under); Novice (9 11); Junior (12 13); Senior (14 19). This contest is open to all youth regardless of 4-H or FFA enrollment. There will be a ribbon winner in each category and age group. There will also be buckles presented to the overall winner in each age group on Friday, August 25th at 6:00 pm in the Events Arena. The showmanship contest will consist of two parts:
 - a) **Showmanship with a Rabbit** The showmanship with a rabbit will be patterned after the American Rabbit Breeder's Association Showmanship Contest.
 - b) **Written Test** The written test portion will come from the 4-H Rabbit Project Books. Novice questions will come from Rabbit I; Junior questions will come from Rabbit II; Senior questions will come from Rabbit III. These books are available at the Extension Office.

- 1. See Junior Livestock General Rules.
- 2. Heifers will only be accepted from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm on Monday, August 21st.
- 3. Heifers are not required to be registered but must show pure bred characteristics of their breed.
- 4. Heifers must be owned by exhibitor since June 15th, 2023. Exhibitors must provide proof of ownership (Bill of Sale) to the Superintendent or Fair Officials upon request.
- 5. Heifers must be free from Brucellosis as shown by vaccinations, tested from accredited herds or from certified free areas.
- 6. Proof of heifer's birth date will be required upon discretion of Superintendent or Fair Officials.
- 7. TB testing papers are required by the New Mexico Livestock Board and will be enforced by the New Mexico Livestock Brand Inspectors.
- 8. Replacement Dairy Heifers will be classified by age.
- 9. Beginning at 6:00 pm on Monday, August 21, 2023, heifers will be brought to the show ring, by a junior exhibitor, not an adult, for official classification by a committee, in class order, i.e.: Class 1, Class 2, etc. Any heifer obviously in the wrong class will be moved to the appropriate class or excused from the show ring at the Superintendent's discretion. Also, at this time, Class 6 and Class 7 heifers will be toothed and pregnancy tested. During this process, there will be no adults in the chute area besides fair officials and/or the veterinarian.
- 10. Class 1 Spring Heifer Born March 1, 2023 May 31, 2023
 - Class 2 Winter Heifer Born December 1, 2023 February 28, 2023
 - Class 3 Fall Heifer Born September 1, 2022 November 30, 2022
 - Class 4 Summer Yearling Heifer Born June 1, 2022 August 31, 2022
 - Class 6 Spring Yearling Heifer Born March 1, 2022 May 31, 2022
 - Class 6 Winter Yearling Heifer Born March 1, 2022 May 31, 2022
 - Required to be confirmed pregnant
 - Class 7 Heifers born September 1 December 31, 2021
 - Required to be confirmed pregnant
- 11. All Class 6 and Class 7 Heifers must be pregnant. Any Class 6 animal having one set of permanent teeth (inner incisor pair) will be moved to Class 7. Any Class 7 Heifers having two sets of permanent teeth (inner or second incisor pair) will be ineligible to show. Permanent teeth are defined as adult teeth with no signs of baby/juvenile teeth remaining.

- The decision will be made by the participating veterinarian. Only Heifers in Class 6 and Class 7 will be pregnancy tested.
- 12. Any Heifer that has been **SOLD** at any previous Junior Livestock Sale will not be eligible to show at this year's fair.
- 13. It is up to the discretion of the Superintendent to adjust classes as necessary. All decision will be final.
- 14. If an exhibitor does not properly care for his animal(s) (feed, water, cleaning pens, etc.) he or she will be disqualified from the show.
- 15. **Neck Ropes:** For the safety of the animal, exhibitor and general public neck ropes for diary heifers are recommended while in stalls.
- 16. **Dairy Heifers must be bedded on cedar fiber.** No wood shavings are allowed.

If the effect of the Covid-19 affects the number of animals shown in a species, then the sale committee reserves the right to adjust the number of animals sold in that species.

- 1. All sale animals will be exhibited in the Junior Livestock Department and owned by a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County.
- 2. An exhibitor will be limited to sell one animal.
- 3. Animals eligible are: 15 Meat Goats, 6 Market Beef, 16 Market Lambs, 16 Market Swine, and 7 Dairy Heifers, determined on a percentage basis of the actual number of animals exhibited. Two (2) Rabbit meat pens and two (2) Poultry meat pens if eleven (11) or more pens of the species are exhibited. Otherwise only 1 meat pen of the species will be sold. One (1) Bird from the 4H/FFA Fancy Class.
- 4. No other items will be auctioned **during the sale**.
- 5. Second Chance Sale Slot rules and procedures:
 - a) The slot will be decided by a random drawing, the exhibitor must be present to win.
 - b) Only one entry per junior livestock exhibitor will be put into the drawing.c) You are only eligible for the second chance sale slot once in your

- show career.
 d) The exhibitor may choose which animal they want to sell.
- 6. Reserve Breed Champions will be eligible to sell. If selling the Reserve Breed Champion exceeds the number of animals allocated on a percentage basis; a sale position will be created.
- 7. A breed division/or class must factor into a sale position to be eligible for representation in the sale using the percentage basis. The formula is as follows: Take the number of animals in the class divided by total of number of animals shown in that species. Then multiply by number of sale slots in that species, the sum equals number of sale slots for that species. The sum must be greater than .61 to factor into a sale slot.
 8. If all animals in a class are pulled, that sale position is forfeited.
- 9. The number of animals eligible to sell in each class will be determined and posted prior to each Junior Livestock Show.
- 10. Any exhibitor who wishes to pull an animal from the sale must fill out a "Pull Form" which is available at the Jr. Livestock Office located in the Jake Lopez Building. Deadline to submit a "Pull Form" is Thursday, August 24th, by 8:30 pm. All pulls are final. If no "Pull form" is completed, the first animal you have eligible to sell will sell.
- 11. Any animal sold through this sale is not eligible to show at the New Mexico State Fair or the Eastern New Mexico State Fair as this is considered a disruption of ownership.
- 12. Exhibitors are required to sell their own animals unless excused by the Sale Superintendent.
- 13. Market Goats, Market Beef, Market Lambs, Market Swine, and Dairy Heifers will be sold by the head. Rabbits and Poultry will be sold by the pen.
- 14. A packer's bid will be available (if one may be obtained) for the Market Beef, Dairy Heifers, Market Lambs, Swine, or Goats. For sale animals only.
- 15. Any carcass condemned within 14 days of the sale, will forfeit sale and add-on money.
- 16. In the event an eligible animal dies before the sale, the next qualifying animal in the class will automatically be moved into the sale.
- 17. Should an animal which has been sold die before it is released on Sunday, then buyer will not be charged the packer price. And the exhibitor will not be paid the packer price.
- 18. Any unethical practice to eligible sale animals prior to or following the sale will cause that animal to be barred from the sale or forfeit sale receipts and add-on money.
- 19. The Junior Livestock Committee reserves the right to mark all

- animals sold through the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 20. Each animal sold in the sale will have 7.6% of the proceeds and add-ons deducted to help finance promotion for securing buyers to participate in the sale. The cost of the buyer's pictures will be deducted if a sponsor cannot be secured.
- 21. Sale animals will be released to the purchaser beginning at 6:00 am on Sunday morning 8/27/2023. Packer animals must be in designated pen area by 8:00 am on 08/27/2023.
- 22. Terms of the sale are cash, and buyers are expected to settle with the Sale Management immediately after the sale. Direct transactions with the exhibitor and the potential buyers are not permissible.
- 23. Sale and add-on monies for sale animals will be available, once payments from the buyers are secured and each exhibitor has written a "THANK YOU NOTE" to each contributor. The exhibitor will be required to turn these <u>self-addressed</u>, <u>stamped</u> thank you notes to the sale secretary before the exhibitors' check will be released.: Mail Thank you notes to:

- 24. All exhibitors selling animals in the Junior Livestock Sale are expected to assist in cleaning the sale and barbecue area prior to the sale and immediately following the barbecue. Exhibitors will meet Friday Morning at 11:00 am in sale arena to decorate and prepare for sale.
- 25. The barbecue meal is open to buyers, sellers, and supporters of the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 26. Exhibitors will be included in the Roosevelt County Youth for Youth Buyers' Club for a \$25 fee to be deducted from sale proceeds.
- 27. Any sale information will be posted on a front door or window of the Jake Lopez Building.,
- 28. All decisions of the Junior Livestock Sale Superintendent and/or Sale Committee are final.


