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RULES AND REGULATION

DECISIONS OF JUDGES WILL BE FINAL

Rule 1

- SEC 1** THE ROOSEVELT COUNTY FAIR OFFICIALS RESERVE THE FINAL AND ABSOLUTE RIGHT TO INTERPRET THESE RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND ARBITRARILY SETTLE AND TO DETERMINE ALL MATTERS, QUESTIONS AND DIFFERENCE IN REGARD THERETO, OR OTHERWISE OUT OF, OR CONNECTION WITH, THE FAIR.
- SEC 1** ANY PERSON WHO VIOLATES ANY OF THE FOLLOWING OR SPECIAL RULES WILL FORFEIT ALL PRIVILEGES AND PREMIUMS AND BE SUBJECT TO SUCH PENALTY AS THE GOVERNING BOARD MAY ORDER.
- SEC 3** THE ROOSEVELT COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL BE IN CHARGE OF THE MERCHANTS BUILDING.
- SEC 4** FAIR OFFICIALLY OPENS TUESDAY, AUGUST 23RD AT 5:00 PM.

Rule 1

POLICING AND LIABILITY

- SEC 1** THE ROOSEVELT COUNTY FAIR OFFICIALS WILL TAKE EVERY PRECAUTION FOR THE SAFETY OF THE VISITORS AND EXHIBITS, BUT ASSUME NO LIABILITY FOR PERSONAL INJURY OR FOR LOSS OR DAMAGES TO ANY PROPERTY OF THE CONCESSIONAIRE, EXHIBITOR OR PATRON DUE TO THEFT, TORNADO, WEATHER CONDITIONS OR OTHER CAUSES.
- SEC 1** THE USE OR POSSESSION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IS PROHIBITED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

RULE 3

ENTRIES, RELEASES, AND REMOVALS

- SEC 1** COMPETITIONS WILL BE OPEN TO ROOSEVELT COUNTY RESIDENTS, A CURRENT ENROLLED STUDENT OF A VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT IN ROOSEVELT COUNTY, A 4-H OR FFA MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING IN A ROOSEVELT COUNTY CLUB OR A ROOSEVELT COUNTY EXTENSION ASSOCIATION CLUB.
- SEC 1** NO SUPERINTENDENT SHALL, UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, ALLOW THE ENTRY BOOKS TO GO FROM HIS/HER POSSESSION, OR TO BE INSPECTED BY ANYONE, EXCEPT AUTHORIZED OFFICERS UNTIL ENTRIES CLOSE. ANY EXHIBITOR OR PERSON ACTING AS AN EXHIBITOR FOUND LOOKING THROUGH THE ENTRY BOOKS OF THE EXHIBITORS WILL FORFEIT ALL PREMIUMS OR MONEY WON.
- SEC 3** EXHIBITS ERRONEOUSLY ENTERED MAY BE TRANSFERRED BY THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE DEPARTMENT TO THE PROPER SECTION FOR JUDGING AND SHALL BE CONSIDERED AS HAVING BEEN ORIGINALLY ENTERED IN SUCH SECTION AND THE RECORD SHALL BE CHANGED ACCORDINGLY.

- SEC 4** STALL CARDS FOR JUNIOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF EACH EXHIBITOR TO CREATE, MAKE AND DISPLAY ABOVE THEIR STALLS. YOU CAN CONTACT THE FAIR OFFICE FOR A TEMPLATE FILE ONLY.
- SEC 5** NO ENTRY WILL BE CONSIDERED COMPLETE UNTIL ALL FEES AND CHARGES HAVE BEEN PAID.
- SEC 6** ALL ENTRIES MUST BE MADE AT THE TIME AS SPECIFIED IN THE SCHEDULE.
- SEC 7** EXHIBITS HAVING NO COMPETITION WILL RECEIVE AWARDS ON A MERIT BASIS TO BE DECIDED BY THE JUDGE.
- SEC 8** THE EXHIBITOR IS RESPONSIBLE FOR CLEANLINESS AND SANITARY CONDITIONS OF EXHIBITS AND AREAS INSPECTED AND CLEANED AT THE EXHIBITOR'S EXPENSE.
- SEC 9** ALL EXHIBITS NOT PICKED UP WILL BE KEPT AT THE EXTENSION OFFICE FOR A PERIOD OF 30 DAYS. ARTICLES NOT PICKED UP DURING THAT TIME WILL BE DISPOSED OF.

FAIR PARKING

Exhibitor & Vendor's

1. Vehicles inside the fairgrounds must have an exhibitor car pass visible at all times or vehicle will be towed at the owner's expense.
2. The driver and all passengers must have an armband on before vehicle will be allowed to enter the fairgrounds.

Public Parking

1. Available in the Extension Office Parking lot, 705 East Lime Street and at the west entrance on Boston Street between the County Road Barn and the Police Department.
2. Do not park in the areas reserved for Extension Office Personnel on the east side of the Extension Office.

Livestock Trailers

1. Once all livestock has been unloaded; exhibitors must take stock trailers home.

RV's

1. You will need to park in designated RV parking area only, in assigned spaces, reserved and paid (\$15.00) for in the Extension Office by July 29th at 5:00 pm.
2. No electrical, sewer or water connections will be provided.
3. Generators must be turned off by midnight.
4. RV users must check-in at the Fair Office.
5. RV's must be in place by 8:00 pm on Monday, August 22nd.
6. All trash and debris must be cleaned up before premium checks will be issued.
7. No RV's will be allowed to enter after the fair opens to the public.
8. Space is limited, First come, first served basis.

Indoor Exhibit Superintendents

1. Youth Building Superintendents enter in the West gate and you can park ???
2. Home Art Building Superintendents enter in the West gate and you can park behind the Home Arts Building.
3. Fine Art Building Superintendents enter in the East gate and you can park ???

Merchant Building Vendor's

1. Enter in the West gate, you must have a car pass and an arm band to enter at this gate. You can park behind the Merchants Building.
2. If you do not have an arm band, you must first go to the main gate and purchase an arm band before you can enter onto the fairground in your vehicle.

1. Judges' decision is final
2. Duplicate ribbons will not be awarded. Only one 1st, 2nd & 3rd place ribbons and premiums will be given in each class.
3. A person can enter only one item in a class, unless stated otherwise.
4. Three or more similar entries will constitute a class. Otherwise, entries will be grouped and judged in "Any Other".
5. All articles entered for prizes must be the work of the exhibitor, made within the past two years, completely finished, and never exhibited at the Roosevelt County Fair.
6. Articles must be clean. All wearing apparel must be new/clean.
7. All pictures and wall hangings must be ready for hanging.
8. No accessories or props allowed.
9. If you are not from Roosevelt County, to be eligible to enter items, you must be, a regularly enrolled student of a Vocational Agriculture Department in Roosevelt County School, a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in a Roosevelt County Club or a member in good standing in a Roosevelt County Extension Association Club.
10. **"Special Needs" is defined as a child or adult who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits or restricts ability to complete the exhibits in this department in comparison to most people.**

11. To be accepted, a complaint must be made before exhibits are removed from the building.
12. Exhibits will not be released before 4:00 pm on Monday following the end of the fair. Idsinga Pavilion, Home Arts and Youth Buildings will be open to exhibitors between 4:00 pm & 6:00 pm to release entries and take down booths. Checks will be distributed at the front door of the Home Arts Building.
13. The Roosevelt County Fair will not be responsible for articles left after 6:00 pm Monday following the closing of the fair. Articles not picked up within 30 days will be disposed of.
14. Superintendents will exercise all care but cannot be responsible for stolen, lost or damaged articles.

1. The Roosevelt County Fair and 4-H Department shall not be held responsible for damage, loss or theft of exhibits. All items are entered at your own risk. While we do our best to handle each item carefully and respectfully, there is always some risk of damage or loss.
2. Entries will be taken on Monday, from 10:00 am to 5:30 pm.
3. Member may enter only one exhibit per class in appropriate age group.
4. 4-H'ers must be enrolled in the project or activity.
5. Judging will be based on the standards listed including any size guidelines in the 4-H project book. Judges determine the merit of each exhibit. If multiple qualified items are in a class, they will be placed 1st – 3rd, however, a judge may determine that no item meets the standard for 1st and choose not to award one. No more than one of each placing may be awarded in each class. If an item is the only entry in a class, judges will judge the time against the standard and may choose to award a 1st, 2nd or 3rd place or no placing at all.

6. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and completed during the current 4-H year, and you must be a member in good standing in a Roosevelt County 4-H Club.
7. All Self-Determined entries must be accompanied by a completed Self-Determined Project Record Form 100.SD-I (R-03) or project appropriate record form. Self-Determined items that do not have a sheet will be disqualified – be sure the sheet is securely attached.
8. Tape or sew a label giving exhibitor's name, county and years of project on each article. This is in addition to the fair exhibitor label to be added at the Fair.

Exhibit Sizing Guidelines:

A. Posters:

- a. Posters may be no larger than 14" X 22" (this is half of a standard sheet of poster board). Posters are defined as any flat paper, foam board, cardboard or other backing appropriate for hanging on the wall for display. Flat items placed on stands or with stands attached will be considered posters and the stands will not be utilized for display.

B. Display Boards:

- a. Display Boards may be no larger than 18" X 48" (this is a small size display board or half a standard display board). Display boards are defined as scored, freestanding science boards that may be purchased at any school supply store. These boards made freestanding by the sides being folded in slightly.

C. Other Exhibit Boards

- a. Exhibit bases for three-dimensional vertical display is defined may be no larger than 24" X 24". A vertical display is defined as an exhibit with a solid base where the exhibit itself rises up. This would apply to small engines, Self-Determined, or any other appropriate 3-D display.

D. Project Specific Boards

- a. Some Project boards are given specific measurements with the project. For example, leather craft and braiding have guidelines in the project book. If an exhibit is defined by the project book, that rule must be followed.

E. Oversized Exhibits

- a. Because of security and space limitations, extremely large/heavy project exhibits may not be accepted for display in the 4-H department.

F. Photography Exhibits

- a. See specific sizing guidelines under the Photography Sections. Photos may be mounted or matted with a material strong enough to withstand transport and display (cardboard, mat board, poster board,

etc.). The Fair Board and 4-H staff are not responsible for lost or damaged photos – please keep a copy of all prints submitted.

3. To be eligible, exhibitors must be an unmarried, a regularly enrolled student of a vocational agriculture department, a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County and not passed their 20th birthday by January 1st of the current year.
4. All animals in the Market Classes will be weighed or measured at the fairgrounds on Entry Day (Steers and Breeding Beef Wednesday at 10 am).
5. Superintendents have the authority to make exhibit groups to fit classes as he or she sees fit.
6. Ownership deadline will be on or before the State Fair validation for Roosevelt County exhibitors. Roosevelt County validation dates coincide with State Fair validation dates for Roosevelt County. All animals must be validated and tagged to show.
7. The owner must show his/her own animal at the time of judging. Should the owner have more than one animal in a class, a junior substitute will be allowed. Substitutes must qualify under Rule 3.
8. There will be no limit to the number of animals that any one exhibitor may have in one class. No exhibitor may receive more than two (2) premiums in the same class.

9. Animals entered on a partnership basis (brothers, sisters, etc.) will be considered as one exhibit. Rule 3 will apply.
10. Should there be any unnecessary or embarrassing delay in bringing animals into the show ring, the Superintendent may exclude such animals from competition.
11. Interference with judges. If any exhibitor in any way, in person, or by agent or servants, interferes with the judges using their adjudication, or show disrespect to them or the show, the management may also withhold from such exhibitors such premiums that they may have been awarded or take such other steps as they deem desirable.
12. First Year Feeder Class is open to all First Year Feeders who have never exhibited that species at a County Fair. Any breed of that species is eligible. Animals will also compete in respective class in market Show.
13. All animals presented for exhibition at the Roosevelt County fair shall be free from contamination of infectious diseases, and shall be subjected to examination on arrival at the fairgrounds, and to daily inspection during the fair. Should any animal be found to be infected with any contagious infectious or communicable disease, it shall immediately be removed to a place of quarantine. The show pens or stall in which such diseased animal or animals were kept must immediately be cleaned and disinfected under the supervision of the official veterinarian.
14. The Fair officials reserve the right to refuse entry of stock that is no, in their judgment, in suitable show condition. Furthermore, the right is reserved to exclude such unfit stock from the grounds.
15. A sifting committee shall be appointed by the Junior Livestock Superintendents. The committee will sift any inferior animals that may hinder the quality of the show. Sifting will take place at 5 pm, Monday, August 22nd. Sifted animals must be removed from the barn immediately.
16. Livestock Superintendents will assign pens, Exhibitors are responsible for their own display cards. Templates are available from the Extension Office.
17. Exhibitors must furnish all water pails and feed boxes. Public tanks and feed boxes are unsanitary and unsafe.
18. Animals, stalls and pens must be neatly kept. **Only sand can be used for bedding for sheep and goats. Cedar fiber will be used for steers and airy heifers. No straw or wood chips allowed in Event Center, Wood chips must be used for swine, rabbits and poultry.** Pathways and approaches must be kept clean for the convenience of spectators. The work must be completed by 10 am each day.
19. EXHIBITORS WILL BE EXPECTED TO CLEAN OUT STALLS AND PENS BEFORE FAIR PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID.

- 20. ALL Livestock including Poultry will be released between 6:00 am and 9:00 am, Sunday, August 28th. All animals MUST be removed from fairgrounds by 9:00 am.**
21. Protests – Three (3) individuals must submit written protests and be accompanied by \$50 cash or certified check which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Superintendent of the Show immediately after the occasion for such protest. Protests must be submitted either prior to judging or immediately after the conclusion of the CLASS judging. One an animal reaches championship judging, NO protest will be accepted. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal that judge overlooked an animal will be considered.
- 22. All livestock must meet the New Mexico Livestock Board inspection/tagging requirements and have inspection papers.**

ROOSEVELT COUNTY FITTING

1. The exhibitor must be “actively” involved in preparing their animal for the show. The exhibitor’s involvement is the responsibility of the parents/guardians.
2. All livestock must be clipped before they arrive at the fair. Touch up clipping is allowed and is left up to the Superintendent’s discretion.
3. The use of any products or substance administered internally or used externally to alter their appearance or conformation of an animal for exhibition is prohibited.
4. Artificial or mechanical exercise equipment is banned from the fairgrounds.

HERDSMANSHIP CONTEST

Herdsmanship begins upon arrival on the fairgrounds until the close of the fair

Herdsmanship premiums and buckle will be given in the following Junior Livestock Classes:

- Market Goats
- Replacement Dairy Heifers
- Market Lambs
- Market Beef*

*Breeding Beef and Market Steer Awards have been combined

The following rules will apply in order to be eligible:

1. The exhibitor shall be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County or have shown a beef heifer as it is an open show.
2. The animal shall be entered in the livestock show by the exhibitor.
3. The conformation of the animal or animals WILL NOT be judged. Only the Herdsmanship ability of the exhibitor. (Fitting, grooming presentation, and/or showing, appearance of exhibitor, sportsmanship, etc. will be judged).

The Herdsmanship contest will be based on participation of each of the following for the DURATION OF THE FAIR:

- Neatness and cleanliness of stall or pen area
- Animals presented in stall/pens
- Care and feeding of the animals
- Cooperation between exhibitor with superintendents and/or peers, etc.
- Participation during weigh-in time

HERDSMANSHIP SUGGESTIONS

A good herdsman of any kind of animal:

1. Is aware that the primary purpose for showing an animal is to assist the animal in making a favorable impression on the judge.
2. Makes sure that both he/she and his/her animal are clean and well groomed.
3. The feet of his/her animal trimmed to permit it to stand and walk correctly.
4. Brings the animal into the ring promptly. Makes it his/her business to find out when the class is to be judged.
5. Is alert and follows explicit instructions issued by the judge, clerk or ringmaster.
6. Is courteous at all times, particularly to the judge and competing showmen.
7. Is prepared to give a prompt and correct answer to any questions pertaining to the animal.
8. Gives the animal his/her undivided attention while in the ring. Smoking or chewing tobacco at such times is a breach of etiquette.
9. Is a modest winner and a gracious loser. Winner of runner-up honors always offers congratulations to first prize or championship winner.
10. Does not leave the ring until the class is placed and records completed.
Retirement from the ring takes place in the order of the placing of the class.

1. To be eligible, exhibitors must be a resident of Roosevelt County or regularly enrolled student of a vocational agriculture department, a 4-H or FFA member in good standing in a Roosevelt County Club.
2. There will be (2) divisions: Junior Open and 4-H/FFA. Youth cannot enter both Junior Open & 4-H/FFA.
3. Pre-registration required by Friday, July 29th, 5 pm in the Extension Office.
4. Birds will be entered using the following criteria.

Cock	Male	Over 1 Year Old
Cockerel	Male	Under 1 Year Old
Hen	Female	Over 1 Year Old
Pullet	Female	Under 1 Year Old

Young Trio	2 Pullets and 1 Cockerel	Under 1 Year Old

Waterfowl and Other pure breed will be shown as singles only.

All birds in any pen must be of same breed.

Birds may be shown by one (1) exhibitor in one (1) division.

5. APA and BA recognized breeds accepted. No cross breeds accepted, except for Meat Pen. **Fighting Breeds will not be accepted.**
6. All Rooster with spurs longer than one inch (1") will be not be allowed to enter.
7. The Superintendent can refuse any entry deemed harmful due to disease or parasites.
8. Decisions of the judges are final. Unsportsmanlike conduct can cause the entries to be disqualified and all awards forfeited.
9. All entries are cared for by the exhibitor. Eggs become property of the Poultry accidents, mistakes, loss or damage that should happen to occur. All entries entered at sole risk of the owner.
10. Judging will be Tuesday, August 23rd at 10 am. The poultry area will be open during judging for anyone interested in observing the show.
11. **MEAT PEN** open to only 4-H and FFA members who are enrolled in the poultry project or SAE to qualify. Chicks should be hatched after June 1st of this year. Meat pens shall have a minimum per pen weight of 12 lbs. with an average of 4 lbs. per bird and a maximum per pen weight of 18 lbs. with an average of 6 lbs. per bird. Birds in Meat Pen the Champion Meat Pen will be eligible at the Junior Livestock sale on Friday, August 26th. If 11 or more meat pen entries are shown, the Reserve Champion Meat Pen will sell as well.

12. **4-H/FFA Fancy Class** is open to chickens, waterfowl or turkeys. Champion or Reserve Champion class award may be a single entry, a trio, or a member of a trio. The judge will place the top eight (8) birds, with the Champion being the first eligible bird for the Junior Livestock Sale on Friday, August 26th. In the event that the exhibitor of the champion bird chooses to pull the bird from the Junior Livestock Sale, the next placing exhibitor will become eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale. Only one bird from the 3-H/FFA Fancy class will be eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale.

BARN DUTY

- All Poultry Exhibitors and a parent or guardian will be required to sign up for "Barn Duty" which consists of 2 hour shifts during the fair week.
- Barn Duty responsibilities include but are not limited to:
 - a) Maintaining water in all cages,
 - b) Prevent the public from harassing, poking, or feeding the birds,
 - c) Answer questions from the public about poultry care and showmanship,
 - d) Clean trash and other debris from barn area including manure and wood chips.

Entries will be released on Sunday, August 28th, between 6:00 and 9:00 am.

Birds **MUST** be out by 9:00 am.

All pens, floor and surrounding area needs to be cleaned by the exhibitors at this time.

Failure to do so may result in loss of showing privileges next year.

1. The Rabbit Show will be open to all unmarried YOUTH residents of Roosevelt County who have not passed their 20th birthday by January 1st of the current year.
2. The Junior Rabbit Meat Pen and the Junior Showmanship Competition will be open only for a 4-H/FFA member in good standing in Roosevelt County.
3. The General Livestock Rules will apply to 4-H and FFA members.
4. All Rabbits must have a readable permanent tattoo in the left ear.
5. The Superintendent reserves the right to refuse entry of rabbits deemed harmful to other entries because of disease or parasites.
6. All Rabbits are entered at sole risk of the owner. The management will not be responsible for any accidents, mistakes, loss or damage that occurs.
7. The Rabbits will be cared for by the exhibitor during the duration of the fair.
8. The decisions of the judge will be final. Unsportsmanlike conduct will cause the entry to be disqualified and all premiums to be forfeited.
9. Only recognized pure breeds may be entered in the show. Crossbreed rabbits will be accepted in the meat pens. The Judge and Superintendent will make classes as they consider necessary.
10. Junior Rabbit Meat Pen will consist of three (3) rabbits not to exceed 10 weeks of age. **Each Rabbit shall weigh no more than five and a half pounds (5 ½).**
11. All Rabbits must be owned 30 days prior to the fair.
12. All youth exhibitors bring their animals to the judging table.
13. Parents, leaders, guardians, etc. are allowed to help the exhibitors. If an exhibitor cannot be present the day of the show, arrangements must be made, in advance, with the Superintendent.
14. No person, other than the show officials, judges and clerks will be allowed behind the judging tables during judging. Keep in mind that distracting the judges with conversation and questions about your animal during the show is considered inappropriate.
15. No entries will be accepted without pre-registration, due on-line or in the Extension Office by Friday, July 29th by 5:00 pm.
16. All Rabbit exhibitors and a parent or guardian are **REQUIRED** to sign up for "Barn Duty" which consists of a 2-hour shift during the fair week. See the Superintendent for the sign-up sheet.

Barn duty responsibilities include but are not limited to:

- a) Maintain water in all rabbit cages.
 - b) Supervise the public while viewing the rabbits not allowing them to poke, feed, or harass rabbits.
 - c) Answer questions from the public about rabbit care, management, and showmanship.
 - d) Keep area clean and free from debris and trash including manure and woodchips.
 - e) Any additional duties as deemed necessary.
17. All Rabbits will be released at close of show on Saturday except the Meat Pens placing 1st – 5th, All Best of Breeds, Champion and Reserve Best of Show. Any junior exhibitor wishing to display his/her rabbit for duration of the fair will be allowed to. Arrangements need to be made with the Superintendent for care and feeding of rabbits. Rabbits remaining at the fairgrounds after the rabbit show will be released Sunday, August 28th from 6:00 – 9:00 am.
18. Only rabbits entered into the fair may remain on the fairgrounds after the show. No additional rabbits may be brought to the fair during the week. Also, no rabbits may be sold during the course of the fair.
19. Showmanship contest – Exhibitors may sign up for showmanship the day of the show. There will be four age categories: Booster (8 and under); Novice (9 – 11); Junior (12 – 13); Senior (14 – 19). This contest is open to all youth regardless of 4-H or FFA enrollment. There will be a ribbon winner in each category and age group. There will also be buckles presented to the overall winner in each age group on Friday, August 26th at 5:00 pm in the Events Arena. The showmanship contest will consist of two parts:
- A. **Showmanship with a Rabbit** – The showmanship with a rabbit will be patterned after the American Rabbit Breeder’s Association Showmanship Contest.
 - B. **Written Test** – The written test portion will come from the 4-H Rabbit Project Books. Novice questions will come from Rabbit I; Junior questions will come from Rabbit II; Senior questions will come from Rabbit III. These books are available at the Extension Office.

1. See Junior Livestock General Rules.
2. Heifers will only be accepted from 7:00 am to 5:00 pm on Monday, August 22nd.
3. Heifers are not required to be registered but must show pure bred characteristics of their breed.
4. Heifers must be owned by exhibitor since June 15th, 2022. Exhibitors must provide proof of ownership (Bill of Sale) to the Superintendent or Fair Officials upon request.
5. Heifers must be free from Brucellosis as shown by vaccinations, tested from accredited hers or from certified free areas.
6. Proof of heifer's birth date will be required upon discretion of Superintendent or Fair Officials.
7. TB testing papers are required by the New Mexico Livestock Board and will be enforced by the New Mexico Livestock Brand Inspectors.
8. Replacement Dairy Heifers will be classified by age.
9. Beginning at 5:00 pm on Monday, August 22, 2022, heifers will be brought to the show ring, by a junior exhibitor, not an adult, for official classification by a committee, in class order, i.e.: Class 1, Class 2, etc. Any heifer obviously in the wrong class will be moved to the appropriate class or excused from the show ring at the Superintendent's discretion. Also, at this time, Class 6 and Class 7 heifers will be toothed and pregnancy tested. During this process, there will be no adults in the chute area.
10. Class 1 – Heifers born in 2022.
Class 2 – Heifers born November 1 – December 31, 2021
Class 3 – Heifers born September 1 – October 31, 2021
Class 4 – Heifers born July 1 – August 31, 2021
Class 5 – Heifers born May 1 – June 30, 2021
Class 6 – Heifers born January 1 – April 30, 2021
Class 7 – Heifers born September 1 – December 31, 2020
11. All Class 6 and Class 7 Heifers must be pregnant. Any Class 6 animal having one set of permanent teeth (inner incisor pair) will be moved to Class 7. Any Class 7 Heifers having two sets of permanent teeth (inner or second incisor pair) will be ineligible to show. Permanent teeth are defined as adult teeth with no signs of baby/juvenile teeth remaining.

The decision will be made by the participating veterinarian. Only Heifers in Class 6 and Class 7 will be pregnancy tested.

12. Seven (7) Dairy Heifers will be in the Junior Livestock Sale.
13. Any Heifer that has been **SOLD** at any previous Junior Livestock Sale will not be eligible to show at this year's fair.
14. It is up to the discretion of the Superintendent to adjust classes as necessary. All decision will be final.
15. If an exhibitor does not properly care for his animal(s) (feed, water, cleaning pens, etc.) he or she will be disqualified from the show.
16. **Neck Ropes:** For the safety of the animal, exhibitor and general public neck ropes for dairy heifers are mandatory while in stalls.
17. **Dairy Heifers must be bedded on cedar fiber.** No wood shavings are allowed.
18. Class numbers used by fair secretary will be 13501 – 13510

New Mexico Livestock Board Rules

For Transporting Horses to the Roosevelt County Fair Youth Horse Show

- Proof of ownership for in district (Curry and Roosevelt Counties) May use one (1) of the following:
 - Horse branded with owner's permanent Brand
 - Permanent Ownership Papers from NMLB (1-H) or Temporary form (1)
 - Registration Papers in your name
 - Bill of sale written from previous owner to you with complete horse description – name, color, age, sex, markings, scars, brands

NMLB Supervisor prefers either your permanent brand on the horse or permanent ownership papers (1-H). If you have a horse that you raised or for some reason have no proof of ownership, call the brand inspector at the number listed below and the brand inspector will come to your house and inspect the horse there. This allows time to establish reasoning and create ownership papers.

- Any horse coming from out of district requires either a 1-H or a form 1 inspection.
- Permanent papers (1-H) are good for the life of the horse or until you sell the horse.
- Any horse coming from out of state requires a Health Certificate and a current Coggins (not over 1 year old).
- You can stay in touch with other Horse Guidelines at www.nmlbonline.com. The only thing that would go above and beyond is if there is a reason to implement stricter health guidelines for disease purposes.

HEALTH REQUIREMENT – NEW MEXICO LIVESTOCK BOARD

The Federal Equine Infectious Anemia Uniform Methods and rules requires a negative EIA test dated within 12 months of equine being entered into exhibitions or competitive events, entering sale barns and at change of ownership.

GENERAL RULES and REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitor must be a resident of Roosevelt County or a member in good standing in a Roosevelt County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter and shall not have reached their 20th birthday by January 1st of the current year. Special Needs Exhibitors must be a resident of Roosevelt County or a member in good standing in a Roosevelt County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter but age requirements are waived.
2. General Livestock Rules apply.
3. Age groups for point classes are:
 - a. Senior Division 15 – 19;
 - b. Junior Division 10 – 14;
 - c. Novice 9 and under – see number 4;
 - d. Special Needs Child or Adult – Age Waived – See number 5.
4. All Novice Division classes will be walk/trot classes. A contestant in this division may move up to Junior Division if he/she is capable of loping their horse in a controlled fashion. Exhibitor must move up in ALL classes if choosing to lope (even Showmanship). **MAAY ONLY ENTER ONE AGE GROUP.**
5. Special Needs Division: Eligibility for the Special Needs Division will be determined according to the label of “special needs” applying to mental or physical disabilities or circumstances that create an exceptional situation requiring individualized educational programs, physical accessibility or primary care requirements. All classes in this division are walk only.
6. Horses are not required to be registered. Ponies may be entered in any classes.
7. In the interest of promoting our horse show for Roosevelt County Youth, the exhibitor must have owned the horse 90 days or more prior to the show. If the exhibitor is not the owner of the horse, the horse will have been under the care of the exhibitor for 90 days or the bridge between owner and exhibitor for ownership requirements if owner is not an immediate family member. Printed, detailed information available at the Extension office.
8. When submitting your entry for the show, it **MUST BE** accompanied by a copy of the ownership paperwork as required by the New Mexico Livestock Board as listed in the beginning of Youth Horse Show rules. Bear in mind, if the ownership document is a bill of sale, gift statement or lease/use agreement, it must contain the same descriptive information (name, age, color, sex, markings, scars, brands) as found on other required documents. Some documents, such as registration papers and old NMLB permits, have information on both sides. Be sure to copy and submit **BOTH** sides.
9. HORSE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS by New Mexico Livestock Board states “the Federal equine Infections Animal: Uniform Methods and rules Requires a negative EIA test dated within 12 months of equine being entered into exhibitions or competitive events, entering sale barns and at change of ownership”. **MUST** submit complete clear copy with entry form.

10. ONLY HORSES WITH A RECORD OF ENTRY are allowed on the grounds. This keeps the Horse Division in compliance with the other livestock division regarding exhibiting.
11. Make sure the **horse's name is the same on all documents** submitted – entry form, ownership paperwork, health paperwork. If you are using the horse's nick name, BE SURE that name is on all required documentation so it will track back to your entry.
12. DOGS – Roosevelt County regulations require all dogs to be on leash.
13. Other than the Weanling Stallion/Gelding class, exhibitors may not show a stallion. WEANLINGS – MALE OR FEMALE – ARE NOT CONSIDERED FOR GRAND OR RESERVE CHAMPIONSHIPS.
14. Trail classes will be ridden by appointment. You may NOT school your horse over the trail course prior to competition. Before opening trail for judging, exhibitors will be able to walk over the course on foot with the judge. The walk through is called a few minutes before classes resume after the lunch break. This is the time to ask questions.
15. Etiquette for the arena – Exhibitors are at show, they will not be allowed to wear anything into the arena that identified them. We know exhibitors are proud of their winning but do not ride in a class with those ribbons on you or your horse.
16. Patterns for all classes will be posted prior to the class. Check with show office on the grounds for locations.
17. Judged by AQHA rules. Judges may alter the dress requirements at their discretion. Any questions may be directed to the Superintendent. To order a copy of AQHA Rule Book, call (806) 376-4811 or go to www.aqha.com. Special Needs Division judged according to Roosevelt County Fair Horse Show Supplemental Information available by request.
18. Check you AQHA rules regarding tack for horsemanship, pleasure and trail classes. Examples of prohibited tack: hackamores, tie-downs, closed reins are NOT allowed in these classes. Check AQHA rules for complete information.
19. Timed Events are pictured to run in a forward manner, at speed from start to finish. After the run has started, if the exhibitor has to back their horse before crossing the finish line, it will be considered failure to follow the pattern and they will be disqualified.
20. No horses will stall at the fair and no horses are allowed on fairgrounds.
21. Buckles for High Point Classes (#14001 – 14025 are not point class classes) will be given in each division:
22. The following point system will be used for the points classes:

Placing	Points Awarded
1 st	6 points
2 nd	5 points
3 rd	4 points

4 th	3 points
5 th	2 points
6 th	1 point

Any tie for high point in a division will be decided by the individual placing highest in Horsemanship.

Points will be figured by the fair office after the results are turned in. High Point award winners will be contacted prior to the awards presentation.

POINTS STAY WITH HORSE AND RIDER COMBINATION.

23. A break of at least 30 minutes will be taken between halter/showmanship and performance classes. The FUN CLASS will be held before break begins or after break ends – whatever will work best for schedule. During the break you may warm your horse up in the arena. WALK ONLY SPEED LIMIT APPLIES OUTSIDE THE ARENA AT ALL TIMES. The Superintendent will arrange for pictures of Grand and Reserve Champions. If you leave the grounds for lunch and do not make it back when classes start, the class will NOT be held open for you. FYI- various restaurants will deliver.

SAFETY: Any child/person riding or handling a horse outside the arena in a manner that is hazardous to self or another person or horse, will be asked, by authorized staff, to wait on foot in a location considered safe for all. This will be in effect for the remainder of this show. Failure to observe 'walk only' areas may also result in rider waiting out classes on foot in designated area. Authorized Staff are those wearing green staff badges.

HALTER DIVISION – no stallions other than weanlings.

For safety, halter classes only, an adult may accompany the child into the arena. The child is expected to handle the horse – the adult is there in case horse becomes more than the child can handle and will step in to prevent accident.

14001 Kid Pony – Lead in Halter – No entry fee but MUST fill out entry form by deadline and ownership and health requirements apply. (For ages 9 and under only). Ponies must be 52" and under. Will be measured. Ribbons only. No premiums. Not a traditional halter class but a place for kids to start their show career. Blue ribbon class.

- Special Kid Pony Attitude LEROY Award – Horse Show staff chooses the pony they think best demonstrates a good attitude and interactions with their child in and out of the arena.

- 14002 Weanling Stallion/Gelding – Current year foal – not eligible for Grand Champion – may enter on mare’s ownership paperwork.
- 14003 Yearling Gelding – required to enter on own ownership paperwork. May not enter class 14004
